

A New Year Message from the Bishop of Chelmsford



“RING out the old, ring in the new!” goes the saying – as though the old year was something to be chucked into the nearest rubbish bin.

Study Notes on the Sunday Gospel

Matthew 2: 1-12

Introduction & Context

Matthew, in writing “In the time of King Herod”, sets a *late date* for the birth of Jesus: Herod the Great, puppet king of Judah, died in 4 BC. “Wise men” (Latin: *magi*) were members of a Persian caste of astrologers and interpreters of dreams. For the star, see Numbers 24:17-24.

Herod’s fears are aroused because his dynasty may be ended. He consults the religious experts to find out where the magi should look for the Messiah. They quote Micah 5:2 and 2 Samuel 5:2.. The maximum age of the children to be killed in Herod’s edict (v. 16) tells us the “exact time” (v. 7) that he learnt from the wise men. V. 8 is classical political duplicity. The star guides them to Bethlehem, where they are “overwhelmed with joy” (v. 10). The gifts are extremely generous.

Once you are settled and are ready to go:

- Read the passage slowly and reflectively
- Note anything that particularly strikes you and refer to the notes if they are helpful
- Spend a few moments in quiet reflection
- If you are a group, share your reflections in pairs or as a whole group (remembering that each person will have different perspectives and views on the passage)
- Read the passage for a final time and give thanks to God for the gift of his holy word.

English for Women

MANY of you have supported and followed the story of our project 'English for Women'.

Since moving into the 2nd floor of Threadneedle House we have grown significantly, and what started out as an Afghan language group has now become a truly international drop-in centre. Over the last few weeks we have welcomed women from Ecuador, Tunisia, Afghanistan, Algeria, Romania, Hungary, Egypt, Peru, Albania, Iran, Turkey, Bangladesh, China, Colombia, Brazil, Libya, Pakistan, France and Spain. If you consider that our volunteers past and present come from the UK, Ireland, USA, Germany and South Africa you can imagine just how international we have become. Whatever their background, all appreciate having the opportunity to practise their English with our friendly

volunteers and to learn about British culture.



Some of the women bring their pre-school children, who enjoy the professionally equipped playgroup area, and watching their progress over the months has been extremely rewarding. Many are frightened and insecure when they first arrive, but after a few weeks they happily join in with the other children, with nursery songs and fun activities, such as foam games and craft activities.

Word about this wonderful project is spreading gradually, and more and more women are finding us, who would otherwise remain isolated or at least not know how and where to integrate. The other



day a wonderful Iranian lady came up to me and hugged me to say thank you. She has lived here since 2008, but had hardly any English at all. She is now making good progress and her smile each day says it all.
