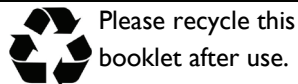

Study Notes on the Sunday Gospel

Luke 23: 33-43

Introduction & Context

Jesus has been betrayed, arrested, mocked, beaten, and sentenced to death. Now he arrives at Calvary (v. 33).

Jesus continues his ministry of giving forgiveness to those who have not heard the Good News (v. 34). The division of his clothing fulfills Psalm 22:18; to be deprived of one's clothing was to lose one's identity. The mob contemplates what is happening, but the "leaders" (v. 35) taunt Jesus: they blaspheme against God. In accord with Psalm 69:21, Jesus is offered "sour wine" (v. 36) – to revive him, and to prolong his ordeal. Ironically, "Messiah of God, his chosen one" (v. 35) and "King of the Jews" (v. 38) are all true. A placard was placed around the criminal's neck, bearing an "inscription" (v. 38) stating his crime. One criminal joins with the mob (v. 39) but the other responds positively to Jesus (vv. 40-41). For him there is salvation; Jesus pronounces him free of sin. Only a king can give pardon. ("Paradise", v. 43, was the Jewish name for the temporary resting place of the godly dead.)

Once you are settled and are ready to go:

- Read the passage slowly and reflectively
- Note anything that particularly strikes you and refer to the notes if they are helpful
- Spend a few moments in quiet reflection
- If you are a group, share your reflections in pairs or as a whole group (remembering that each person will have different perspectives and views on the passage)
- Read the passage for a final time and give thanks to God for the gift of his holy word.

Now we are five

THE SPECIAL TIME OF ADVENT marks a time of reflection when we look ahead in wonder at the birth of Jesus and look back at times of celebration throughout the year.

The fact that we are not exactly sure when Jesus was born, seems to most of us irrelevant for it is the celebration of the event, the remembering and the love that matters. Christian Fathers, such as Saint Hippolytus of Rome apparently believed that Jesus was born on a Wednesday so we're happy with that!

At Welcome on Wednesday we



have always believed that we are celebrating God's love for us - just like in our own homes when we give our visitors the very best we can offer to make them feel special. But this is God's home and we are doing this on his behalf and it is in this very act of service that we realise that we are, indeed, truly humbled. That we meet, for the most part, inside the Cathedral itself is, for most people, the icing on the cake.

2016 - a year of big celebrations - the Queen was 90, Sister Ann was 80 and we are five. But we must surely be the longest-running pop-up café - starting from nothing and operating purely from donations. We have been open every Wednesday from 1.00pm until 3.00pm since 2011, including every Christmas time and New Year offering hospitality (hot tea-cakes and delicious home-made cakes by Gerald @ co.cakes) to all and to those burdened by life's worries, we offer a listening ear, support and prayer if required. Starting with a group of five, we now have a team of 18 who are totally discreet, loyal and reliable.

Four of us operate a rota for prayers at 2.00pm. This includes the Gospel reading of the day plus short prayers. This interlude,

hopefully, looks fairly casual but we do meet to plan sessions to be factual, succinct and current and prayers are offered for those who require them. Once after praying for those who work across all borders in war-torn countries, a couple came to me and told me they were doctors from Médecins Sans Frontières and that our café reminded them of home in Pakistan where people had set up a similarly warm and friendly café.

The café opens directly after the lunch-time Eucharist - and so God feeds us and we go on to feed others. We have held our own small exhibitions such as the one from our 'artist in residence' and talks from a visitor who takes spectacles to Paraguay every year. Musicians have played from street buskers to practising concert pianists, but although our background music has been curtailed by licensing laws, we are fine with the noise of chatter!

It is heartening to see that the café has become a community in itself where people look out for each other and take part in lively conversations and where lovely people are truly welcomed in for a chat, some peace, sustenance, rest - all emanating from God's love for them.



So we hope the light of Jesus, flickering on each table, will beckon you in, either as a visitor or as part of the team, and help us plan and grow our vision for the next five years!
